"What Is God's House For?"

MATTHEW 21:12-17



1. We come to church to show ourselves as a <u>witness</u> to the world, regarding our love – "By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35).



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- 2. We come to church because we are part of a **body** that gathers "so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another" (Rom 12:5).

3. We come to church to use our **spiritual** gifts – "Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them..." (Rom 12:6a).



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4. We come to church to remember the Lord's <u>death</u> and <u>resurrection</u> – "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes" (I Cor 11:26).

5. We come to church because we are indispensable to others - "21 The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you,' nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' 22 On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable (I Cor 12:21-22).



6. We come to church to hear about the <u>burdens</u> of our brothers and sisters, so that we might learn to walk better through those troubles with them – "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ" (Gal 6:2).



7. We come to church so that we might be equipped for ministry – "11 And he gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers, 12 to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ (Eph 4:11-12).



8. We come to church so that others may grow spiritually – "15 Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, 16 from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love" (Eph 4:15-16).

9. We come to church to <u>sing</u> with one another — "addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with your heart" (Eph 5:19).



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- 10. We come to church to share what we are **thankful** for "giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Eph 5:20).

11. We come to church to show preference to one **another** – "submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ" (Eph 5:21).



12. We come to church to participate in discipleship – "2 Older men are to be sober-minded, dignified, self-controlled, sound in faith, in love, and in steadfastness. ³ Older women likewise are to be reverent in behavior, not slanderers or slaves to much wine. They are to teach what is good,... (Titus 2:2-6)



12. We come to church to participate in discipleship — ⁴ and so train the young women to love their husbands and children, ⁵ to be self-controlled, pure, working at home, kind, and submissive to their own husbands, that the word of God may not be reviled... (Titus 2:2-6)



12. We come to church to participate in discipleship -

⁶ Likewise, urge the younger men to be self-controlled. (Titus 2:2-6)



13. We come to church that our hearts would not be hardened by sin – "12 Take care, brothers, lest there be in any of you an evil, unbelieving heart, leading you to fall away from the living God. 13 But exhort one another every day, as long as it is called 'today,' that none of you may be hardened by the deceitfulness of sin" (Heb 3:12-13).



14. We come to church to allow the Word of God to do its work in our **hearts** – "For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart" (Heb 4:12).



15. We come to church in order to <u>encourage</u> others to good works – "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works" (Heb 10:24).



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16. We come to church because God <u>commands</u> it — "not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some" (Heb 10:25a).



17. We come to church for <u>encouragement</u> – "but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near" (Heb 10:25b).

- 18. We come to church to support our God-appointed Leadership "Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith" (Heb 13:7).

19. We come to church to get a preview of our experience in **heaven** – "And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God" (Rev 21:3).




Model of Herod's Temple, Israel Museum


