- Written to help the people of God celebrate something
- Psalms 50, 81, and 95 are the three festival psalms in the Psalter.
- Written and used during Feast of Booths and Trumpets.
- During these festivals, the *shofar*, or ram's horn, was blown (Joshua 6; Judges 8).



Tame sentiments and shallow interests kill the spirit of devotion.



Why We Don't Sing Out

- 1. Some don't understand that physical expression is an acceptable form of worship both privately and publicly.
 - 2. Some care too often what others think.
 - 3. Some interpret reverence or awe of God as emotional and physical stoicism.
 - 4. Some don't really understand what they are singing.

Examples of Gifts Given by God

- 1. An inheritance that can never be lost (I Peter 1:3-5)
- 2. A grace that can never be limited (2 Corinthians 12:9)
- 3. A hope that can never be disappointed (Hebrews 6:18, 19)
- 4. A joy that need never be diminished (John 15:11)
- 5. A nearness to God that can never be reversed (Ephesians 2:13)
- 6. A peace that can never be disturbed (John 14:27)
- 7. A righteousness that can never be tarnished (2 Corinthians 5:21)
- 8. A salvation that can never be canceled (Hebrews 5:9)

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III. Genuinely repent (vs. 13-16).

"Scripture, listening is equated with obeying. In many passages, a direct connection is clearly made between listening and obeying (Exod 15:26; Deut 6:3-5; Luke 6:47; 8:21; 11:28). They are like two sides of the same coin. They are synonymous terms. In fact, there is a direct lexical link between the words 'hear' and 'obey' in both the Old and New Testament... 
"...The Old Testament word for 'hear' is sama. This is the same Hebrew word used for 'obey.' There is no separate word for 'obey' in the Old Testament. In the New Testament, the Greek word for 'hear' is akouw. The word for 'obey,' hupakou, which literally means 'to hear under,' is a derivative of the word for 'hear.'...
