



Four Steps for Addressing Problems


Four Steps to Addressing Problems

1. Stop to think

- Have you defined the problem well?
- Why is it a problem?
- What would be the outcome if the problem were never resolved?







II. Re-state basic principles (1:12-13).


"We must first remind ourselves of those things of which we are absolutely certain, things which are entirely beyond doubt. Write them down and say to yourself, 'In this terrible and perplexing situation in which I find myself, here at least is solid ground.' When, walking on...



"...moorlands, or over a mountain range, you come to bogs, the only way to negotiate them is to find solid places upon which you can place your feet. The way to get across the morasses and the places in which you are liable to sink is to search for footholds...

II. Re-state basic principles (1:12-13).A. God is <u>eternal</u>.







⁵ And have you forgotten the exhortation that addresses you as sons? "My son, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, nor be weary when reproved by him. ⁶ For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives." ⁷ It is for discipline that you have to endure. God is treating you as sons. For what son is there whom his father does not discipline?⁸ If you are left without discipline, in which all have participated, then you are illegitimate children and not sons.⁹ Besides this, we have...

Hebrews 12:5-11

...had earthly fathers who disciplined us and we respected them. Shall we not much more be subject to the Father of spirits and live? ¹⁰ For they disciplined us for a short time as it seemed best to them, but he disciplines us for our good, that we may share his holiness. ¹¹ For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it.



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

"We often mistake the meaning of a phrase because we take it out of context; but when you put your problem next to its context, the context will generally interpret the text for you. The same is also true of the particular problem that is causing you concern."

- 3. Apply the principles to the problem
 - Take your list from #2, and ask the question, "Why do each of these principles matter?"

<u>I don't have to get answers right away. My time-table is not God's time-table.</u> <u>Praying about my concerns is better than not praying about them</u>

- **Psalm 52:9** I will thank you forever, because you have done it. I will wait for your name, for it is good, in the presence of the godly.
- **Psalm 62:1** For God alone my soul waits in silence; from him comes my salvation.
- **Psalm 130:6** my soul waits for the Lord more than watchmen for the morning, more than watchmen for the morning.
- **Isaiah 40:31** but they who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint.
