Branches of Theology

"In my view, when Scripture tells us about the return of Christ, it doesn't give us this information so that we can put it on a chart and watch the events as they pass by. That would be catering to our intellectual pride, among other things. Why, then, does Scripture have...

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"...so much to say about the last days? So that we can reorder our lives in the light of Jesus' coming....So far as I can see, every Bible passage about the return of Christ is written for a practical purpose—not to help us to develop a theory of history, but to motivate our obedience."

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3 Applications for Studying Eschatology

Then I saw thrones, and seated on them were those to whom the authority to judge was committed. Also I saw the souls of those who had been beheaded for the testimony of Jesus and for the word of God, and those who had not worshiped the beast or its image and had not received its mark on their foreheads or their hands. 3 Applications for Studying Eschatology

 Nicknamed "the eschatological epistles." • 26% of I Thessalonians deals with the future. • 40% of II Thessalonians deals with the future. Includes resurrection, Jesus' return, hope, death, resurrection, judgment, glorification, eternity with Christ, wrath, hell, Antichrist, the kingdom to come, the Day of the Lord, and Daniel's 70th week.

The City of Thessalonica

Population barely 200,000 people. Founded in 316 B.C. by Cassander, king of Macedonia, who named it after his wife (Thessaloniki) and daughter of Philip II and half-sister of Alexander the Great Ruled by politarchs (Acts 17) A prominent seaport and along an important route called the Egnation Way that connected Philippi to Thessalonica to Berea.

Church barely 1 year old

Purpose: to commend them in their new faith and to prepare them live in light of the hard days to come

Purpose and Date

But now that Timothy has come to us from you, and has brought us the good news of your faith and love and reported that you always remember us kindly and long to see us, as we long to see you for this reason, brothers, in all our distress and affliction we have been comforted about you through your faith.

For this reason, when I could bear it no longer, I sent to learn about your faith, for fear that somehow the tempter had tempted you and our labor would be in vain.

and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead, Jesus who delivers us from the wrath to come.

For what is our hope or joy or crown of boasting before our Lord Jesus at his coming? Is it not you?

so that he may establish your hearts blameless in holiness before our God and Father, at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints.
