Walking to Please God (I Thess 4:1-2)

KEY POINT:

We please God by <u>being ready</u> for what is to come.

- Maybe Paul hadn't addressed it.
- Maybe they needed a refresher.
- Maybe they were experiencing death or martyrdom.
- Maybe false teachers were spreading lies.
- Maybe the grief was so intense.
- Maybe they didn't want those who died to miss out on Christ's return.

Why Were They Asking About the Resurrection?

I. Previewing What Is to Come (vs. 13-14)

A. Based on God's Truth (vs. 13)

Yes, we are of good courage, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord.

Charles Spurgeon "Death, A Sleep"

- 1. The view of Jehovah's Witnesses and Seventh Day Adventist
- 2. The idea that after a person dies, that person's soul goes nowhere.
- 3. The Bible uses "sleep" to refer to someone's death (Matt 27:52; Mark 5:39; John 11:11-13; Acts 7:55-60; 13:36).
- 4. A reference to the body in the earth until it is resurrected (I Cor 15:35-37).

What About Soul Sleep?
