




- Why Romans 7:14-15 is describing a Christian
 - 1. Non-Christians do not desire to obey The Law of God (vs. 15-16, 18-19, 21-22)
 - 2. It is clear Paul loathes sin within him

It is right to <u>acknowledge</u> and <u>lament</u> the internal struggle between <u>sin</u> and <u>obedience</u>.



Old Man, Sin Nature and Flesh

- 1. Old Man all that we were in Adam, which has been crucified with Christ
- 2. **Sin Nature** the predisposition to evil; our capacity to sin
- 3. **Flesh** the remnants of the old man or sin nature
